# **Perceptions & Reality: Education**

#### WHAT IS AN EDUCATION?

Why do people go to school? What is important about learning? Why did you come to college? What factors motivated you to choose college rather than work, the military, or living in your parents' basement after high school? We have several cultural narratives surrounding higher education that encourage us to attend college--that going to college will help you get a better job, for example, or that tell us what the college experience should be—that college will help us gain independence from our parents or help us to find ourselves. These narratives shape what we expect the college experience to be and our approaches to college and higher education.

This paper will identify a belief that a particular group of people (students, parents, teachers, government employees, coaches, employers, etc.) hold about college and make a claim, supported by research, about *why* people hold that belief and how accurate that belief is.

### **ASSIGNMENT**

In this paper, you will identify a belief that a particular group of people have about education and explain, using outside resources, why people have that belief. Once you have explained why people hold a certain belief, you will need to use sources to argue how accurate that belief is, in comparison to what you believe and what evidence from outside sources show education is really like. As with the previous papers, this paper will take the form of an essay with a thesis, supporting paragraphs and the use of source material to support your claims.

This paper is going to be the most formal we've written this semester, so while you can still draw on personal experience, you are looking to demonstrate how your personal experience is part of a larger experience that may be shared by many people. You are looking to make a more general claim about education that is applicable to many people, not just yourself.

Your paper needs to be 3-4 pages and to include at least 4 sources that you locate on your own. These sources must be academic, rather than popular sources. Academic sources include scholarly books, academic articles, documentaries, and scholarly blogs. You may also use popular sources such as websites or popular publications like magazines and newspapers, **but these do NOT count toward your 4 source total.** 

You must summarize 1 of the sources, rather than taking a direct quote from it.

#### **STARTING POINTS**

- What do people think the purpose of education is in society? (Think about the Shorris and Edmundson readings)
- Why do people think education is important? Why have people in your life told you education is important?
- What do people think the role of athletics should be in education?
- What do people think the role of the arts should be in education?
- Do people think there more ways to learn besides going to school? What do they believe are the advantages of going to school? What are the advantages to learning outside of school?
- What do people think students supposed to learn in school? In college?
- Why do people think they should go to college? Why do people think people should not attend college?
- Who do people think should pay for college?
- What do people think is the ideal college experience? Why?
- How do people think technology influences education? Do people think technology should be an important part or focus of education? Why or why not?

#### **FORMAT**

Your Education Project should follow standard writing conventions and the following format:

- You will need to give your project an interesting and relevant title (Not Education Paper).
- Your paper needs to have a heading in MLA style
- Your paper needs to have a header in MLA style
- Your paper should be double-spaced, with 1 inch margins, and 11 or 12 point font. Please use standard fonts such as Calibri or Times New Roman.
- You need to cite your sources in MLA style and include an MLA style Works Cited page.
  - THE WORKS CITED PAGE DOES NOT COUNT IN THE PAGE REQUIREMENT.
