WHAT IS SELF-IMAGE?

We spend billions of dollars a year on our self-image. What is so important about self-image that it dominates our spending and plays an active role in many decisions we make on a daily basis? This assignment will explore both your personal self-image and the ways the people around us shape our self-image.

ASSIGNMENT

In this paper, you will draw directly on the readings from *Mirror on America* to support a claim you make about how you formed your own self-image. This paper will take the form of an essay with a thesis, supporting paragraphs, and the use of source material to support your claims.

This paper might discuss and analyze an experience you had in the past, connecting it to the similarities, or pointing out the differences, between your experiences and the readings. Or it might discuss how a part of your self-image conforms to or goes against norms. Or it might argue for the benefits or drawbacks of a particular part of your self-image.

Your goal is to demonstrate how specific experiences shaped a part of your self-image or your self-image at a particular time and support your claims with the outside readings.

Your paper needs to be 2-3 pages and to include at least 3 citations from the at least 2 of the assigned readings.

STARTING POINTS FOR EXPLORING SELF-IMAGE

- What is unique about my appearance?
- Have I ever been made fun of because of my appearance? Have I made fun of others?
 - o Why did that happen?
- Have I been judged because of my appearance? Have I judged others?
 - o Why?
- What aspects of my appearance do I control?
 - o What aspects have I intentionally altered?
- What aspects of my appearance are beyond my control?
- How has my appearance been altered by medical procedures?
- What do I find beautiful or attractive in others' appearances? What do I find not attractive?
 - o Where did I get these ideas?
- How do I feel about my appearance? Why do I feel the way I do?
- What cultural factors impact our views of ourselves or other people?

FORMAT

Your Exploring Self-Identity Project should follow standard writing conventions and the following format :

- You will need to give your project an interesting and relevant title (Not Exploring Self-Image).
- Your paper needs to have a heading in MLA style
- Your paper needs to have a header in MLA style
- Your paper should be double-spaced, with 1 inch margins, and 11 or 12 point font. Please use standard fonts such as Calibri or Times New Roman.
- You need to cite your sources in MLA style and include an MLA style Works Cited page.
 - O THE WORKS CITED PAGE DOES NOT COUNT IN THE PAGE REQUIREMENT.
