# **Visual Argument Poster Presentation**

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### Assignment

This assignment is an individual poster presentation in which you will present the main ideas from your Sports, Entertainment, and Technology project. Poster presentations are brief, informal presentations where presenters create a visual display of their work and small groups rotate around the room listening to several simultaneous presentations. The less formal style allows presenters to discuss their work with those listening and to answer questions from their small audiences.

Your presentation should include: (1) a basic introduction to the idea or group of people you are making a claim about, (2) an explanation of the way this idea or group is presented in media, (3) your images and information that challenge what most people think about your topic or that show why what most people think is inaccurate or wrong. Your goal with this presentation is to share your findings with others orally and in visual format, so that they can learn about the project you did and the conclusions you've drawn from your project.

#### What should the Visual Argument Presentation do?

Your presentation should

- Introduce the group or idea that you researched and did you project on
  - O Who or what did you research?
  - O What are common examples of this group or idea?
  - O Why did you choose this topic?
- Explain the ways this group or idea are typically presented
  - O What do people typically think about this group or idea?
  - O Where do we typically see this group or idea in media?
  - o How are they typically represented?
- Explain why that representation is inaccurate or wrong.
  - What data do you have to show the ideas people typically have are wrong?
  - What images or examples do you have to challenge the ideas people typically have about this group or idea?

#### What should the Visual Argument Presentation look like?

A poster presentation, as described above, has 2 parts: (1) a visual display and (2) an oral presentation.

#### **POSTER**

Your poster component needs to be some visual display that might be an actual poster or some other type of large scale image. You are also welcome to bring in artifacts to supplement your visual component and to communicate information from your presentation. You want your visual argument to be understandable, even if a person hasn't heard your whole presentation. The visual argument must be clear without explanation.

#### **PRESENTATION**

For your oral presentation, you are expected to take between 3-5 minutes to make your presentation. You have lots to cover and you need to cover it clearly and relatively quickly. You also need to be prepared to answer questions from your audience..

## **Assessment**

This assignment is worth 50 points (10%) and counts as your Final Exam Grade. The following rubric will be used to assess your presentation.
