

Research Portfolio Poster Presentation

ENG 113

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Assignment

This assignment is an individual poster presentation in which you will present the findings from your research project. Poster presentations are brief, informal presentations where presenters create a visual display of their work and small groups rotate around the room listening to several simultaneous presentations. The less formal style allows presenters to discuss their work with those listening and to answer questions from their small audiences.

Your presentation should include: (1) a basic overview of your project and research population, (2) a description of your methods, (3) your data and findings, and (4) what you learned from your data. Your goal with this presentation is to share your findings with others orally and in visual format, so that they can learn about the project you did and the conclusions you've drawn from your project.

What should the Research Report Presentation do?

Your presentation should

- Introduce your research project and the community you've researched
 - Who did you research?
 - What problem or issue did you investigate?
 - What were your research questions?

*****You'll want to draw from your Community Profile, Problem Statement, & Research Report**
- Explain the methods and instruments you used
 - What was your primary instrument?
 - What was your data collection process?

*****You'll want to draw from your Method Justification & Research Report**
- Report your data and findings
 - What data did you actually collect?
 - What is the basic population and demographic information from your study?
 - What patterns did you find in your data?
 - What did these patterns tell you?

*****You'll want to draw from your Research Report**
- Reveal and explain your conclusions
 - What did you learn from your data?
 - How did your data answer your research questions?
 - What suggestions, recommendations, or new ideas do you have for people listening to you?
What should they take away from your research?

*****You'll want to draw from your Problem Statement & Research Report**

What should the Research Method Presentation look like?

A poster presentation, as described above, has 2 parts: (1) a visual display and (2) an oral presentation.

POSTER & HANDOUT

Your poster component needs to be some visual display that might be an actual poster, a PowerPoint presentation or some combination of the two. You are also welcome to being in artifacts, images, you're your visual component needs to communicate information from your presentation that will allow someone who hasn't heard your whole presentation to understand your project.

In addition to your visual component, you need a handout that people can pick-up and take with them. The handout needs to convey the information from your presentation and visual component, but also needs to be compact enough to fit on 1 page.

PRESENTATION

For your oral presentation, you are expected to take between 5-6 minutes to make your presentation. You have lots to cover and you need to cover it clearly and relatively quickly. You also need to be prepared to answer questions from your audience.

Assessment

This assignment is worth 100 points (10%) and counts as your Final Exam Grade. The following rubric will be used to assess your presentation.
