WHAT IS REALITY?

In *The Running Man*, we see “reality” TV in which Ben Richards competes on shows designed to appear realistic, and which has real consequences for him and many others, but which are clearly manipulated to present the “Running Man” in a certain way. In Ben’s case, he is presented as violent, degenerate and as the villain on the show, despite the fact that the show employs someone whose job is to hunt Ben down and kill him. The hunters are depicted as the heroes. From this story, and from many of our own experiences, we can see how “reality” can be controlled and manipulated by the images, words, and sounds we connect to them. Thus, how we think of particular people, places, ideas, etc. can be shaped by the messages in the world around us.

This project asks you to choose a topic connected to sports, entertainment (films, video games, movies, music) or technology and to both explore how that concept is presented in various forms in the media (television, films, music, magazines, ads, social media, etc.) and to present a visual argument that challenges how your topic is presented and provides alternate depictions to create a more detailed, well-rounded picture of the reality surrounding the concept you choose.

ASSIGNMENT

There are 2 parts to this assignment. Part 1 is a large-scale visual argument that makes a claim about how you see the reality surrounding the concept you choose, and shows the limitations of how the concept is generally presented to the general public. You will need to collect and/or create various images/depictions of your topic to determine how it is generally presented. Then, you will need to look for/create alternative perspectives and demonstrate how these perspectives expand how people can think about your topic.

Once you have collected your images, you’ll need to design your visual argument. Your visual argument should make use of images, text, color, size, image placement, etc. to emphasize certain points and convey your general message about how your topic is generally presented in media and what that presentation omits and what you think is a more realistic presentation.

Your visual presentation needs to include at least 10 images. You will need to include a photo of your completed visual argument with your completed portfolio.

Part 2 is a 3-4 page textual version of your visual argument. It is meant to accompany the visual project and to present details or information that is more easily conveyed by text than visual images. This portion of the project should have a thesis that presents your argument about how your concept is represented and how you feel that representation is inaccurate or limited.

Your textual version should cite at least 5 sources that support your claims about how topics are depicted or why they are depicted a particular way.

You will need to compose both parts of the assignment at the same time so that they work together and present a coherent argument.

FORMAT

The visual part of your Perceptions & Reality: Sports, Entertainment & Technology project should be large-scale (poster or display-board size). You can create a physical collage or you can use photo editing software to create a digital collage. Whichever method you choose, you must have a color display suitable for an exhibit which we will do as your Final Exam.

The textual part of your Perceptions & Reality: Sports, Entertainment & Technology should follow standard writing conventions and the following format:

- You will need to give your project an interesting and relevant title (Not Visual Argument).
- Your paper needs to have a heading in MLA style
- Your paper needs to have a header in MLA style
- Your paper should be double-spaced, with 1 inch margins, and 11 or 12 point font. Please use standard fonts such as Calibri or Times New Roman.
- You need to cite your sources in MLA style and include an MLA style Works Cited page.
 - THE WORKS CITED PAGE DOES NOT COUNT IN THE PAGE REQUIREMENT.
