English Education Returns to Trine

The Department of Humanities and Communication is excited to announce that an undergraduate degree in English Education is now available at Trine University.

In a collaborative effort, the Department of Humanities and Communication and the Franks School of Education have received approval from the Board of Trustees to begin offering English Education as a program of study beginning in Fall 2017, following approval from the Indiana Board of Education at its November 2016 meeting.

The reactivated program is a response to the increasing need for qualified English teachers in northeast Indiana and the surrounding areas.

In March 2015, the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Postsecondary Education's *Teacher Shortage Areas* 1990-1991 through 2015-2016 indicated that Indiana reported English/Language Arts as a shortage area in 2011-12. In February 2016, a

survey of the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) job listings showed 7% of available positions mid-schoolyear are in English Language Arts (36 of 491 openings).

The states of Michigan and Ohio show similar need. Ohio has reported a shortage of English/Language Arts teachers for grades 7-12 consistently since 2004-2005. The number of English/Language Arts jobs listed on the state department of education's website mid-year was similar to that of Indiana's.

Jordan Blank (2018), a transfer student from Defiance College, will be first English Education graduate from the new program. We look forward to seeing the growth of this program over the next few years and to welcoming English Education students on to campus.

Nicholls Promoted to Dean

Amy Nicholls was recently appointed Dean for the Jannen School of Arts and Sciences to replace previous dean, Craig Laker. Laker will now head up the College of Graduate and Professional Studies as its new dean. Nicholls' new position will have her overseeing five separate departments—Mathematics, Informatics, and Physics; Criminal Justice, Psychology, and Social Studies; Music; English as a Second Language (ESL); and, of course, Humanities and Communication (HAC).

Department faculty were excited for both Nicholls and the department. "As soon as it was announced that Professor Laker was moving to another position, I think we all thought of Amy as a perfect choice for his replacement," said HAC professor Justin Young. "I think she'll serve as a strong advocate for both the department and the School of Arts and Sciences, as a whole."

Nicholls will remain within the Department of Humanities and Communication and continue to teach and serve as Chair for the 2016-17 school year. She has been with Trine University for five years and is the 2016 recipient of the Jannen Renaissance Scholar Teaching Award.

Professor Justin Young will assume the responsibilities as Chair at the conclusion of the 2016-2017 academic year.
